A Message from Jeff Mckay

Out-of-State License Plates

Over the past few years there has been a growing problem with vehicles with out-of-state license plates being housed in our neighborhoods. Our County's location is a big draw from people all over the country for both temporary and permanent relocation. With a few exceptions, including active duty military families, everyone living in Fairfax County is required to register their vehicle where it is housed and pay taxes. We found that there were many new and existing residents that were not complying with this law.

In April of last year, I wrote a Board Matter that asked our legislative staff to draft corrective language for a proposed amendment to the state code to ensure that the penalty for not paying property taxes is levied each year for as long as a resident vehicle with out-of-state plates is not in compliance with Virginia registration requirements.

After much research and investigation, the Board of Supervisors alongside the Fairfax County Police Department, Sheriff's Office, and Department of Tax Administration (DTA) is working together to enhance enforcement of these offenders. The County's newly updated and streamlined TARGET program allows residents to report potential offenders online and two-way communication to keep up to date with the status of tips. The Fairfax County Police Department's parking enforcement officers are also cracking down on out-of-state license plates.

The TARGET program has proven to be very successful and has already yielded positive results in the first several months of implementation. To date, more than 2,000 vehicles have been added to the DTA's tax records and over \$600,000 was due in October. I have confidence these figures will only grow. Because the state severely limits how we can collect revenues, making sure everyone is operating within the law is vital. Abiding by property tax laws and registration requirements is not only mandated by state law but fair and economical, as well.

Winter Outerwear Collection

This fall, businesses across the Greater Springfield area will be collecting winter outerwear for local families in need.

The Greater Springfield Chamber of Commerce's annual winter outerwear campaign aids underserved residents in our community.

"Living here in the Greater Springfield area is a blessing we often take for granted," said Nevin Gibson, chair of the Chamber's community affairs committee, which organizes the annual drive. "We're proud to have hosted this campaign for many years. The drive assists our neighbors who find themselves in economic straits during the harshest months of the year."

Businesses will serve as collection locations Monday, Nov. 14 through Friday, Dec. 16, 2016. Donations to the winter outerwear campaign support ECHO and Koinonia, two local organizations supporting residents in need in the Greater Springfield area. Volunteers retrieve collected items and prepare them for distribution this winter.

The collection locations will accept winter outerwear, including new winter hats, new scarves and gloves for all ages, new children's coats, and clean, gently-used blankets. Each year there's a special need for coats, especially in children's sizes infant through 16 and adult plus sizes.



Crestwood Elementary School College/Career Readiness Group




For the 2015- 2016 school year, thirty-three sixth grade students at Crestwood Elementary School self-referred themselves to be part of an after-school club that met once a month led by School Counselor, Ms. Crummett, where they could learn more about post-secondary options through a College/Career Readiness Group.

The group consisted of students completing activities to assist in goal setting for their future and gaining advice from outside sources. Guest speakers included Ms. Carla Shaw, Career Specialist from Lee High School, and Ms. Glenda Sorto, College Counselor NOVA. Local college students, including former Crestwood students, presented in a panel format to the sixth grade students in the group in January 2016 sharing that, if they were to return to sixth grade, they would have been more focused on their academics. In the spring of 2016, students were invited to tour George Mason University to visit a college campus and to learn more about the college admissions process. Prior to this field trip close to 70% of students in the group had never been on a college campus.

dents in the group had never been on a college campus.

As a result of this group, comparing pre and post-test data, there was a 20% increase in students understanding that making good grades helps them to achieve their future goals, and a 13% increase in understanding that the grades made in elementary and middle school affect the classes they can take in high school. Overall students benefited from being a part of the group to help them make connections between the work they are currently doing in school and their future goals. Students shared that the "college visit to George Mason University was a good opportunity and good experience to learn more about how to prepare to go to college."

Students were able to learn about the differences between community, public, and private colleges as well as the college application process. While some may question why to start talking with sixth grade students about options for after high school, 42 % of students in this group shared they rarely or never speak with their parents about attending college. Radford University in a November 2014 article, "Welcome to college, sixth graders" reported that, "Research shows that students who visit college campuses tend to take higher level course in high school and have a high chance of going to college." The idea for this group was taken from the work of the "College in Six" program, a Virginia initiative that encourages sixth to eighth grade staff to take sixth graders to visit college campuses and having manningful learning and discussions about higher education experience. ing meaningful learning and discussions about higher education experiences.



Utility Pole Hazard & Blight?





Shortly after the huge initial success of the Crest-wood's Springfield development, Mr. Carr began building across Backlick Rd to the east with his Yates Village neighborhood, followed in 1954 by Monticello Forest to the southwest of Crestwood. Along with the homes came a post office, a shopping center, Garfield School and other conveniences.


In conclusion, with the 70^{th} anniversary of Mr. Carr's wise purchase and the 65^{th} anniversary of those first Crestwood model homes going into construction, we all can look with pride to the thriving community that was the dream of Edward R. Carr.

Upcoming Anniversaries for Springfield

Did you know that as a Springfield resident, you have two important historic anniversaries coming up in December which have a profound effect on your current life and home being what it is today?

Thanks to a long period of low volume home production and the huge number of people moving into the DC area during and after World War 2, our area was in the midst of an immense housing shortage. Washington area developer Edward R. Carr realized that in order to house the thousands of families moving in, there was a need for a new fully developed "satellite city". As of 1946, "Shirley Highway" (I-95/395) was under construction and well on its way out from the Pentagon, heading past Springfield towards its original terminus at Woodbridge. It was during that year that Mr. Carr learned that one of the last remaining large tracts of land along the new roadway (within commuting distance of DC and could support a "city" as he envisioned one) was for sale. On December 30, 1946, he purchased the initial 2,300 acres of land that Greater Springfield stands on today.

On April 15, 1951, after a five year struggle to get water lines and other utilities out to the, then wilderness, of Springfield, Mr. Carr sold 593 acres of the land to The Crestwood Construction Corp. for them to begin the first fully developed subdivision of this new community. It was during the first week of December 1951 that Crestwood Construction broke ground and began construction of the first thirteen model homes in the block bounded by Backlick Rd, Amherst Ave, Essex Ave & Cumberland Ave. Literally thousands of home-hungry visitors came to visit those model homes during the early part of 1952 and marvel at the comprehensive planning that Mr. Carr had laid out for the area at large. At its height, sales of the Crestwood's Springfield subdivision homes were at a house per day average. Their solid masonry construction, easy to maintain size and nice yard lots held great appeal to those who had suffered living in cramped apartments, basements, attic rooms and even garages during those post war shortage years. The testament to their quality construction is evident in their long and running survival as homes for thousands of families through the years.

Springfield Residents Going Cross County

In late October the SCA's Mark and Bruce completed their second annual through-ride of the Cross County Trail (CCT) that runs mostly along the Accotink Creek, Pohick Creek and Difficult Run stream valleys. The southern terminus is the Occoquan River (Boat ramp in the Occoquan Regional Park); the northern terminus is the Potomac River along Difficult Run in Great Falls. In all, it's approximately 42 miles of trail.

Pictured below are from left to right, Bruce, Bill, and Mark. By serendipity, we were pleased to make the acquaintance of Bill in the Difficult Run section of the trail. As it turns out Bill was the driving force behind the creation

of the CCT years ago. What a delight to meet the person who conceived of a grand recreational adventure for County residents to enjoy walking, biking and even riding horses. Please see Mark's write-up below for Bill's website.

We like to do an annual through ride of the CCT for the physical and navigational challenge and to see the diverse green corridor through Fairfax County. Shortly after the trail was announced I read accounts of through rides and decided to give it a try. It took several years of riding the different trail segments to get a handle on the route of the trail. I met Bruce a few years ago and he mentioned wanting to do a river-to-river through trip. Bruce said that he had done it alone and was game to do it with a partner. This year was our second annual through trip. Despite years of experience we can still manage to get temporarily off course, but generally not for long. This is not a challenge to take lightly. It generally takes 5+ hours of riding to complete the trip!

A Message From Trails for Youth

It's About the Journey and the Kids

The Olympics had me thinking sports recently. We were so excited to hear of the local Olympians taking home medals - Ginny Thrasher, gold for the 10 meter air rifle event and Matt Miller, rowing (7th and 4th). So are there other future Olympians out there in Springfield? Likely so, and possibly in the unlikely sport of mountain biking. Not a sport that comes to mind when thinking about when the DC metro area. But Lake Accotink and nearby Wakefield Park have long been a hotbed for local mountain bike riding and racing with at least three local mountain bikers turning professional. In the kids division there are four youth Virginia State Mountain Bike Champions that grew up on our local trails and have come from our local teams in

the past few years.

EspnW took notice of this and issued a small grant to TrailsforYouth.Org (TYO) to encourage and engage more girls to participate the local mountain biking scene and so far it has been a wonderful experience. Local Springfield girls are mentored by older experienced girls to get their first taste of trails, racing and the po-dium. These efforts and team comradery develop a lifelong love for mountain biking and naturé.

So, is it working? Are more local youth getting involved? Ask Francisk, age 11 (yes with a K) who started mountain biking this year with TYO. She was feeling down after a hard ride where she fell. She was told by Katherine, age 13, one of the older girls "that's ok we all fall." Francisk's mood immediately bounced back and she asked when the next ride was so she could ride more and train for the local uncoming race series. How get the gold. This may be a far cry from getting an Olympic medal but it certainly put a smile on her face and made her family proud. It also instilled a love of sport and nature in her. Her dedication shows every time she rides her bike. Is this the beginning of the Olympic dream, perhaps?

Francisk is just one of the thousands of children TYO has worked with over the last 15 years in the Springfield area. Through our outdoor nature programs, we instill a love of getting outside and active. We provide opportunities for kids to safely participate in trail bike rides, hikes, camping trips and more. These opportunities are sadly not available to the many youth of our community due to their lack of resources. TYO provides the tools, mentoring and support for these kids to begin a journey leads them on their personal trail of empowerment and better health. Can you help us?
