President's Message—Bruce Waggoner

Greetings from the Springfield Civic Association (SCA), now 66 years young and making a difference every day.

By publication of this edition, we will have moved the clocks forward to welcome spring. We do so acknowledging longer daylight hours and warmer temperatures. Makes me happy just to think about it.

It's a pity that January's general membership meeting was thwarted twice by weather; the revitalization - real estate theme was much anticipated. The SCA Board is determined to bring that relevant program to fruition in coming months, so stay tuned. Speaking of relevant themes, on Tuesday, 19 March in Crestwood Elementary's cafeteria, the SCA will host a Lee District Candidates night. It is especially relevant to us because for many years we have worked closely with the Lee District Supervisor and staff; in short, we have become strong partners in protecting our interests and building a better Community. With Supervisor McKay running for Chairman of the Board of Supervisors, four candidates have announced to run for the vacant seat. The four candidates have accepted the SCA's invitation to speak to our membership and take questions, in short, they have accepted the opportunity to interview with a vibrant, active civic association that continues to drive change in Lee District. The SCA Board hopes you will join us in taking advantage of this opportunity to better exercise your franchise in the coming primary and general elections. The four candidates for Lee District Supervisor

are: Kelly Hebron; Larysa Kautz; Rodney Lusk; James Migliaccio.

In other news, the SCA took an active role in the abandoned shopping carts blighting the business district, our homes and streets. We worked directly with State Senator Scott Surovell, even having a member testify in Richmond. In the end, the legislation passed the Senate, but failed in committee in the House of Delegates; the end result is a kind of legislative limbo and may be tried again next year, perhaps in modified form. Time will tell. In the interim, we are not powerless. If you care enough, write to Giant at the corporate level about the number of abandoned grocery carts in our neighborhoods; it is the best way to get the attention of our local Giant and other vendors. (https://giantfood.com/contactus/form/#/contact/store/praise)

The SCA is also participating in potential pedestrian and traffic safety on Commerce Street. Lee District Staff, County offices, VDOT, and local advocates, to include SCA members, are stepping forward on this effort. Patience required.

Meanwhile, the Transportation Security Administration headquarters continues to take form, and the LIDL grocery store lot is leveled and ready for development. The SCA will promulgate news as we hear it on our Facebook page. Tune in and share with your neighbors news we all can use.

Jeff McKay's Update/ Fairfax Green Initiatives

With a growing population and ever-increasing traffic, waste, and carbon emissions, it's imperative that Fairfax County lead the way in combating climate change. I've long been an advocate of solar freedom and many other Green initiatives and that is why I am happy to be a part of Fairfax County's most recent call to protect our environment.

At our Board Meeting on February 5, Supervisor Dan Storck, Supervisor John Foust, and I introduced the Fairfax Green Initiatives Board Matter. This Board Matter (which was approved unanimously by the Board) is a call to action for the County to consider additional endeavors to accelerate our work of addressing climate change and increasing environmental preservation.

As part of the Fairfax Green Initiatives Board Matter, the County will begin developing a Community-wide Energy and Climate Action Plan (CECAP) and a County-specific Climate Resiliency and Adaptation Plan contracting with an energy savings performance contractor (ESPC). These plans and strategies will articulate how the County manages the risk of a changing climate and allows County staff to identify a set of principles to guide effective adaptation practices, all while outlining our vision for a resilient future.




Additionally, we intend to advance the goals and targets of the County's Operational Energy Strategy all while increasing locally generated environmentally friendly energy

(like solar) to offset all County government energy usage. As part of the Fairfax Green Initiative, County staff is committed to increasing and enhancing communication related to climate change and environmental stewardship with residents. These proposed actions will have little to no cost.

Many County efforts and actions are already underway, including a County Energy Policy, our Operational Energy Strategy, Environmental Improvement Program, and sustainability initiatives; we must continue to recognize the importance and urgency of addressing climate change.

I hope this comprehensive review will push state legislatures to give us the flexibility to complete projects successfully and, in the months ahead, I look forward to continuing my work on these issues and making sure Fairfax County lights the way for all other jurisdictions, so we can have a healthier climate for everyone.

Springing Forward with TrailsforYouth.Org

Happy almost Spring! This winter has been busy for TrailsforYouth.Org (TYO). We implemented a pilot program called Girls Rolling and Learning STEM (GRLS) for Springfield girls in grades 5-8 to learn STEM (Science, Tech. Engineering, Math) concepts through bicycles, workouts and hands-on activities (see www.facebook.com/TrailsforYouth.org for lots of pictures). We have almost completed our 8 weeks of class time and will take the girls on a 3 hour research bike ride at Lake Accotink to put into action a variety of concepts they have learned in class (gear ratios, aerodynamics etc.) It's been fantastic to see them learn, workout and have fun.

But now that Spring is almost here, we are anxious to get outside and enjoy the parks and trails. This Spring, in conjunction and support from Mid-Atlantic Off-Road Enthusiasts, we will begin to maintain and clean up the connector trail from Brookfield Park to the CCT at Lake Accotink. We are also planning on cleaning up the Brookfield Park pump track and having that available for local families to enjoy. We will be asking for volunteers soon to help us with the pump track. In addition to activities at Brookfield Park, TYO will be the lead instructors for Lake

Accotink's intro and intermediate mountain bike classes starting in late March and then again in April. 

Mosquito Control

Spring is almost here and summer is just around the corner. It's not too early to think about how to control mosquitoes in your yard.

Tip and Toss That Water

Eliminate Standing water. Mosquitoes can breed in as little as a teaspoon of water. Here are 12 locations to check at least weekly for standing water.

- 1. Buckets, watering cans, bottle caps or any trash that can hold water
- 2. Corrugated pipes of downspout drainage
- 3. Bird Baths and pet water bowls
- 4. Potted plants with saucers
- 5. Children's toys
- 6. Tarps on woodpiles and garden equipment
- 7. Grill and patio furniture
- 8. Wheelbarrows
- 9. Containers under decks and porches
- 10. Garbage cans, recycle bins and other barrels
- 11. Tires
- 12. Boats and boat covers



Treat standing water with a larvicide if it cannot be eliminated. If you cannot get rid of the water, treat it with a mosquito-specific, environmentally-friendly product as "Mosquito Dunks", which are available at hardware stores and garden centers. Follow label instructions when applying.

If mosquitos are bitting, consider treating your yard with an insecticide. Pay attention to areas where they hide, such as dense vegetation and ground cover. Follow label instructions.

Organize a neighborhood clean-up. Get rid of littler and debris, discard old tires and manage vegetation that mosquitoes may use as hiding places. Check all areas for standing water.

2020 Census/Jeff McKay



Every 10 years, the United States Constitution mandates a complete count of the country's population. Census counts impact many different aspects of our lives and are extremely important for funding. On the local level, Fairfax County's population count drives how much funding it receives from the federal government and helps the County plan for future needs.

The data collected from the 2020 Census is vital for our County. In addition to a proper count, the data will lead to necessary federal funding for some of our most important programs and services such as public education, The National School Lunch Program, Housing Choice Vouchers, transportation projects, and infrastructure improvements. It is im-

portant that all residents participate in the U.S. Census because a low count could mean less federal investment in areas that need it most.

U.S. Census data will also help us better organize and structure our district lines here in the County and will lead to redistricting of congressional districts across our nation. We want to ensure everyone is properly represented at the local, state and federal levels of the government.

In preparation of the 2020 Census, Governor Northam approved an \$11.5 million budget for the creation of Complete Count Committees all across Virginia. Last year, the Board formed a 2020 Complete Count Committee for Fairfax County.

In January of this year, the committee had its first meeting. I and longtime Fairfax County resident and volunteer, Tilly Blanding, co-chair the Committee. The group of 26 community leaders, advocates, and County staff is tasked with ensuring the participation of everyone living in Fairfax County through education and public outreach; making sure all residents feel welcomed and understand the importance of the Census.

Washington Cherry Blossoms



Japan gave 3,020 cherry blossom trees as a gift to the United States in 1912 to celebrate the nations' then-growing friendship, replacing an earlier gift of 2,000 trees which had to be destroyed due to disease in 1910. These trees were planted in Sakura Park in Manhattan and line the shore of the Tidal Basin and the roadway in East Potomac Park in Washington, D.C. The first two original trees were planted by first lady Helen Taft and Viscountess Chinda on the bank of the Tidal Basin. The gift was renewed with another 3,800 trees in 1965. In Washington, D.C. the cherry blossom trees continue to be a popular tourist attraction (and the subject of the

annual National Cherry Blossom Festival) when they reach full bloom in early spring. Just outside of Washington, D.C., the suburb of Kenwood in Bethesda, Maryland has roughly 1,200 trees that are popular with locals and tourists.
