Soon we will see construction on the newest store in our midst although I expect more site preparation is necessary before walls and a roof appear. Meanwhile, the Transportation Security Administration (TSA) headquarters construction and fitting out continues apace. However, we will endure some aggravation on this path to renewal involving improved infrastructure to support a better business and more vibrant transportation climate. I refer specifically to the Washington Metropolitan Area Transportation Authority's (WMATA) summer shutdown of the Franconia-Springfield Blue Line from its terminus to Braddock Road, and the construction of the commuter parking facility on the south side of Old Keene Mill Road near the Springfield Methodist Church. Yes, there will be pain, but the long-term gains will benefit Springfield for decades spurring further growth and interest in our part of Fairfax County.

The SCA's May 21st meeting at Crestwood Elementary School will amplify the themes of renewal and transportation. After elections for the 2019-2020 season and a local business beautification awards update, our topics will be:

1. WMATA's proposed plans and expected impacts

2. Fairfax County Department of Transportation's metrics for obtaining residential parking districts

3. Slugging and the commuter parking facility

4. Lake Accotink Park update

We think our agenda worthwhile and useful for a busy community where change is a regular theme. Come out and join your neighbors; you will be made welcome. The social period runs from 7:00 - 7:30pm with business beginning promptly at 7:30. We adjourn no later than 9:00pm.

Jeff McKay's Update



Hello!

It is hard to believe we are already into May. Time is flying by as the Board works on numerous items, including our budget. As the weather heats up so does our Board's busy season.

In addition to finalizing the FY2020 Budget, our Board has also approved several notable items including major investments in our priorities, such as the environment and affordable housing, as well as ensure we'll continue making progress on body-worn cameras for police and early childhood education.

Board of Supervisors Recap

As we get deeper into Spring, the Board is working hard to accomplish everything on our agenda. Below is a summary of what the Board has been up to this past month. If you'd like to access full summaries of all Board Meetings, click <u>here.</u>

- The Board approved my Board Matter on funding for Energy and Climate Planning. This asked the board to consider \$276,749 and two positions for Energy and Climate Planning be added as a Consideration Item for the FY 2020 Budget I further moved that a consideration item for contractual support for the development of a Community-Wide Energy and Climate Act Plan be prepared for the FY 2019 Carryover Review, which was also approved.
- The Board adopted a new ordinance for the Commercial Property Assessed Clean Energy Program, a private loan program to assist commercial, industrial and nonprofit property owners to make energy-efficient, renewable energy, water-saving and climate resiliency improvements to their properties.
- The Board approved a request to the Virginia Department of Transportation that all current and future VDOT projects located in Fairfax County meet the county's local storm water management regulations. This is significant because in order for VDOT to acquire any system (like a road or stormwater pond) it must be up to VDOT standards before it is acquired. In the past, the County and VDOT have held varying stormwater management regulations.
- The Board approved my Board Matter recommending the adoption of the recommended principles contained in the Report of the Embark Housing Advisory Group, which was presented to the Board in February of this year. According to the report, the group found no net loss of affordable units along the Route One Corridor and recommended numerous preservation and expansion strategies They include: Using County-owned land/facilities for affordable housing and working with local Public-Private Partnerships to offer density bonuses and parking incentives among other things.



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Commuter Updates: Try Slugging!

Springfield's New Commuter Parking Garage Will be Unlike any other in Fairfax County. This One Will Be Full of Slugs. -Nicole Miller

It seems like only yesterday I climbed into the backseat of a total stranger's car for the first time. This stranger was taking me all the way to work, and it cost me nothing. It cost my host only the gas they would have used anyway. Since then, my mom has said countless times, "You are riding in cars with strangers? Is that safe?" Known as Slugging, or organized hitchhiking, this ride-share system allows drivers to utilize the high occupancy vehicle (HOV) lanes and cut 30 or more minutes off their commute. During rush hour, drivers in the "Regular Lanes" as they are commonly referred to, gaze longingly at the cars rushing by in the HOV lanes. And in answer to my mom's question, slugging is one of the safest forms of commuting in Northern Virginia. Since the phenomena was created, there have been no reported crimes against sluggers.

What is slugging you probably wonder? Slugging is a ride-share system, sometimes also referred to as Riding in Cars with Strangers, The People's Transit, and Community Carpooling. By 6:00 A.M. a line of commuters in blue and grey business suits, military uniforms, etc. stretches down the sidewalk. The sluggers stand quietly, patiently waiting for their turn to receive a free ride, while drivers line up to pick up passengers and become eligible to use the special "HOV-3" routes, open only to cars holding three passengers or more. A vehicle pulls up to the curb and the driver announces his/her destination to the person at the head of the line – the "caller", who is responsible for relaying the information to the sluggers behind. There are established drop-off and return pickup locations throughout D.C.

There are rules of course: no smoking, no eating or drinking, no phone calls, no messing with the radio, no makeup application, no personal hygiene, no cutting in line, etc. Riders can check their phones, email, read a book, or sleep, and usually there is no talking. A thorough list of slug-line etiquette can be found at <u>www.slug-lines.com</u>. Through the power of social media, I and my admin team have developed the largest social media group for slugging in all of Virginia. We share pertinent information on traffic jams, car accidents, transportation news, items left behind in vehicles, and more.

Slugging has been around for nearly 50 years and Springfield is the first recorded slug-line to Washington D.C. Springfield "Bobs" is the name for the 265-space commuter lot. located across the street from the Springfield Plaza between the Sunoco gas station and Springfield United Methodist Church on Old Keene Mill Road. Fairfax County also leases 265 parking spaces from Springfield Plaza, 100 from the American Legion, and 53 from Springfield United Methodist Church.

Slugging provides an avenue for cost savings that allows many to afford Fairfax County's rising home prices. With median home prices steadily rising, the savings from slugging can provide some relief. The average parking garage in Washington D.C. charges \$25 a day for parking, or \$270-\$400 a month. With the anticipated tolls coming to 395, the influx of top paying organizations relocating to Northern Virginia, and the possibility that the daily commute could skyrocket to \$30-\$40 or more, Slugging is growing in popularity. Recently, the slug-line community has overgrown their current location in Springfield. Depending on the day, telework schedules, etc. available parking at "Bobs" exists until 7:30 A.M. Once full, riders must look for alternative places for parking in the area while risking being ticketed and/or towed. After thousands of phone calls from local residents complaining about the sheer number of commuter vehicles in their neighborhoods, many surrounding neighborhoods have erected no parking signs, no commuter signs, and established residential parking restrictions. Fairfax County heard the slug-line community's cry for help, and with the assistance of the Board of Supervisors, entered into agreement for construction of a multi-modal parking garage. Funding for this project came from a Federal Transit Authority Grant allowing the Board of Supervisors to plan and construct a roughly \$63 million dollar parking facility. They even agreed to erect a bridge for pedestrians to cross Old Keene Mill Road.

The transportation team from Lee District held community outreach meetings and worked with the slug-line community while simultaneously making necessary adjustments for public satisfaction. Not all are satisfied with the final design. Some local homeowners are still very much dissatisfied with the placement relative to their property; however, all agree that without this garage there simply is not enough space for parking in Springfield. The slug-line community shared concern with the seven bus bays that will exist on the ground floor of the garage, however Fairfax County agreed to continue the current leases.

Once the construction begins, the 265-space parking lot currently housing the slug operations will close displacing slugs to alternate locations. Leases are currently being signed by area businesses for hosting slug-lines and for providing additional leased parking. Both will be announced in the near future, as lease negotiations are finalized.

Slugging will endure and continue to grow. The bottom line is that Slugging is the most effective, efficient, and ultimately the fastest way to get to work at a price that can't be beat!







Richard Byrd Library



The Richard Byrd Library originally began as a storefront in 1958. The building at the current location opened in March 1965 and was completely renovated in 2010. The library received certification with a Gold rating under the Leadership Energy Environmental Design (LEED) program, sponsored by the U.S. Green Building Council. A distinctive feature of the new library is our weathervane, an accurate replica of the airplane flown by Admiral Byrd during his exploration of Antarctica and his flight over the South Pole.

We offer free Internet access, technology tutoring, programs for children and adults, a weekly English conversation group, and meeting space for the Springfield community. The library has books, magazines, newspapers, DVDs, and recorded books. Reflecting the diversity of our community, we provide materials for learning English and a World language collection for all ages.

Traffic Calming

Do you know of a neighborhood road that needs a traffic calming study? Contact Joan Clark, Staff Assistant to the Lee District Board of Supervisors at joan.clark@fairfaxcounty.gov. To qualify for a study by the Fairfax County's Department of Transportation, the road must meet the following criteria:

- Be in the state system of highways owned and maintained by VDOT.
- Be classified as a local, collector, or arterial road.
- Function as a residential street.
- Have a speed limit of 25 miles per hour (MPH).
- Have a traffic volume between 500-6,000 vehicles in a 24-hour period.
- Have an 85th percentile speed of at least 35 MPH in at least one direction.

Virginia Department of Elections—Voter Eligibility

To be Eligible to Register to Vote in Virginia a Person must:

- Be a resident of Virginia (a person who has come to Virginia for temporary purposes and intends to return to another state is not considered a resident for voting purposes).
- Be a U. S. Citizen.
- Be 18 years old (any person who is 17 years old and will be eighteen years of age at the next general election shall be permitted to register in advance and also vote in any intervening primary or special election).
- Not be registered and plan to vote in another state.
- Not currently declared mentally incompetent by a court of law.
- If convicted of a felony, your right to vote must have been restored.

Registration Deadlines:

- General Elections = 22 Days before the election
- Primaries—22 Days before the primary
- Special Elections—14 Days before the election
- Special (Called by the Governor) 7 Days before the election

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Social Security Scam

A new scam you will be seeing and hearing more of puts your social security number at risk. In fact, the FTC's Data Spotlight report finds that reports about social security scammers are increasing, while reports about the IRS imposters have decreased. There has been a recent increase in the number of reports from citizens stating scammers claiming to be from the Social Security Administration (SSA) are calling to advise citizens their social security number (SSN) has been suspended because of suspicious activity or being involved in a crime. Sometimes, the scammer will request the citizen confirm their SSN to reactivate it, or will ask for a payoff to keep our SSN or bank accounts safe.

Here's what to know:

• Your SSN is not suspended or about to be suspended.

- You should not verify your SSN to anyone who calls out of the blue.
- Your bank accounts are not about to be seized.

• The SSA will never call to threaten you or your benefits.

• The SSA will not ask you to send money in any form (wire/cash/gift cards). Anyone asking you to do so is a scammer EVERY TIME.

• The real phone number to the SSA is 1-800-772-1213, but be aware that scammers can "spoof" the phone number and make that number show up on your caller ID. If you are worried, hang up and call that number directly.

Here's what to do:

• If you received one of these phone calls, file a report at ftc.gov/complaint

• If you gave your SSN to a caller and are worried about identity theft, or if you know someone used your SSN to open an account, visit identitytheft.gov.





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First Responders, Citizens Honored for Bravery, Compassion and Zeal

Greater Springfield Chamber Honors 9 Individuals and Units at Valor Awards Breakfast

Springfield, VA – A civilian who assisted Fairfax County Police officers in apprehending a shoplifting suspect, a detective who took a simple credit card case and followed it until it resulted in uncovering a nationwide conspiracy and an officer who took a runaway teen under his wing were among those honored Friday by the Greater Springfield Chamber of Commerce at its Valor Awards Breakfast.

The event recognizes first responders in the Greater Springfield area who go beyond their job description to provide exemplary service to the community.

More than 100 businessmen and businesswomen, first responders and elected officials attended the breakfast at the Springfield Golf and Country Club. Staci Redmon, president of Strategy and Management Services Inc. (SAMS), served as master of ceremonies. Col. Edwin C. Roessler Jr., Fairfax County police chief, presented the keynote speech.

Roessler noted Fairfax County is the safest jurisdiction of its size in the United States while maintaining the lowest officer-to-resident ratio of any major U.S. city.

"However, there is no magic formula to the Police Department in and of itself to have that low crime rate," he said. "We are blessed that this word 'engagement' is throughout Fairfax County because engagement helps us prevent and fight crime." In addition to engagement with community groups such as the Greater Springfield and other chambers, Roessler credited the Police Department's close relationships with the Sheriff's Office and Fire and Rescue Department for keeping the county safe.

The awards were presented in four categories: Lifesaving Award, Certificate of Valor, Meritorious Civilian Award and Unit Citation. The recipients were (extended information attached):

- The Lifesaving Award was presented to Fairfax County Police Private First Class Robert Marshall, who, at great personal risk, prevented a subject from committing suicide.
- Certificates of Valor went to three recipients, including Detective Angelena Griffiths of the West Springfield Criminal Investigations Section, who maintains the highest successful closure rate among all property crimes detectives in the entire county and is responsible for uncovering the nationwide stolen credit card conspiracy. Also honored in this category was Fairfax County Police Officer Andrew Zelms of the West Springfield District Station, who took a runaway teen under his wing and kept him safe, warm and fed until he could be reunited with his Maryland social worker. The third honoree was Master Tech Hyun Lee, probationary trainer at Fairfax County Fire and Rescue Department's Fire Station 427, who is credited with training new recruits to the highest standards.
- Volunteer In Police Service (VIPS) Dave Saunders and Eric Oginsky received the Meritorious Civilian Awards. Saunders received the honor for the countless hours he volunteers at the West Springfield District Station. Oginsky was honored for helping Fairfax County police safely apprehend a shoplifting suspect at the Springfield Town Center.

The Chamber awarded three Unit Citations: A Sheriff's Office team that secured a facility during an active shooter call, Lt.
