Please help us welcome the new year at our January 17<sup>th</sup> General Membership Meeting at Crestwood Elementary School (6010 Hanover Avenue, Springfield). Social time will start at 7 pm in the school cafeteria followed by our meeting at 7:30. The presentation on the 17<sup>th</sup> should be of interest to everyone – especially in light of the recent snow problems in Buffalo and other events that can happen right here in Springfield. What's your biggest fear and how can you prepare for it?

Our guest speaker will be Gary O'Neilin, a Crestwood resident, who will be sharing with us information on "Expecting and Preparing for the Unexpected!"

In Gary's own words: "Hello, I'm Gary O'Neilin. I am currently the volunteer lead for the Community Emergency Response Teams (CERT) for zip codes 22150 and P. 5 22152. The CERT Program educates people about disaster preparedness for hazards that may impact their area and trains them in basic disaster response skills, P. 7 such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, and disaster medical operations. I am a retired Army NCO who served for 28 years. My background includes Combat Arms, Signal, Nuclear, Biological and Chemical, Intelli-P. 12 gence, and Cyber mission space. I have served in several operations to include Operation Desert Shield/Storm, IFOR (Bosnia), Operation Enduring Freedom and P.19, Operation Iraqi Freedom. I currently am employed as a cyber threat intelligence 20,21 analyst in support of the Department of Veterans Affairs.



My journey into preparedness began in my teen years ('80s) as a Boy Scout of America. I earned the rank of Eagle Scout. The motto is "Be prepared"! Couple the Scout motto, oath and law together and one develops a mindset of preparedness. I have been lucky enough to live Europe, the Middle East, Africa, South Korea and various parts of the U.S. I am originally from the mountains of Southern California where we had to deal with earthquakes, forest fires, and annual snowfall of more than 6ft every year.

Preparedness is a mind that is the continual evaluation of the near, mid, and far term events and resulting in the confidence to adequately engage with the events with minimal disruption to 'normal' life."

# Supervisor Lusk Update

Dear Springfield Civic Association members,

I hope you all had a joyful and safe holiday season! As I take one final look back at 2022, I am proud of the service my office has done for our residents. I especially appreciate the engagement and active community participation from the Springfield Civic Association.

In total, my office in 2022:

- Completed 403+ constituent casework items for Franconia District Residents.
- Initiated a Springfield market study, which was completed in October. (Read the full study here: <a href="www.fairfaxcountyeda.org/wp-content/uploads/2022/10/Springfield-Franconia-Market-Study.pdf">wm-content/uploads/2022/10/Springfield-Franconia-Market-Study.pdf</a>) The study's goal is to find ways to continue supporting future economic and residential development in the Springfield area.
- Supported Inova Hospital's expansion to Franconia-Springfield, which will add 150 hospital beds & 1,200+ jobs to the local Springfield economy.

• Worked with the Springfield Town Center to approve a new hotel, residential housing, and the Lego Discovery Center. (Photo below)



I am also happy to report that our district is now officially named Franconia. With this name change, our district homepage and my office email have been updated to: <a href="mailto:www.fairfaxcounty.gov/Franconia/">www.fairfaxcounty.gov/Franconia/</a> and <a href="mailto:Franconia@fairfaxcounty.gov">Franconia@fairfaxcounty.gov</a>. My staff will continue monitoring the old Lee office inbox. The county will update the name on signs and other official sites throughout the coming months. Please email my office if you have questions about the renaming or any potential impacts on you or your business.

Lastly, effective January 1<sup>st</sup>, property owners must contain running bamboo on their property and prevent it from spreading beyond their property line. Running bamboo is a fast-growing, invasive grass that can be destructive to the natural environment and suppress native plant species. Property owners may face civil penalties for uncontained running bamboo that spreads to other properties. # Lake Accotink Park Update

### Free Rod Rentals to Help More Anglers Enjoy Fishing Experience

The Fairfax County Park Authority's waterfront parks, including Lake Accotink Park, have launched a new partnership with the Virginia Department or Wildlife Resources to provide a fishing rod rental program with funding obtained through a grant from the Recreational Boating and Fishing Foundation. The program is currently up and running at Burke Lake and Riverbend Parks. The Lake Accotink and Lake Fairfax Park programs are expected to launch in March 2023.

"This is an exciting opportunity to invite more residents to enjoy the experience of fishing, particularly beginners, those who might not have their own gear and those who don't have the means to purchase a fishing rod," said Dan Grulke, Lake Accotink Park Manager.

# Friends of Lake Accotink Park—Positive Impacts in 2022

Our mission: Protect, restore, preserve and educate all concerning the natural, historical and cultural resources of Lake Accotink Park

On behalf of Friends of Lake Accotink Park – FLAP, thank you to all of our Volunteers, Sponsors, Supporters and Dedicated Partners who through their efforts made 2022 our most impactful year. Together, our community of over 1,600 dedicated volunteers eagerly secured their boots, gloves, safety vests, trash tools, bags and positive can-do attitudes monthly to make a positive impact. All projects and activities are funded through donations to FLAP. As a community our ability to ensure positive impacts is endless. Here are some highlights from over 5,800 hours of service:

\*Monthly Clean-Ups The Lake Accotink Park (lake shore/streams/trails- the entire park not just the trail) Clean-Ups are our monthly FLAP clean-ups (we average 120 bags a month or 1440 annually + 5,000lbs of items/tires, bumpers, shoes, metal pipes and trashcans, fence sections, garden furniture...).

\*Dog Waste Stations We now have 11 stations located around the trail and have purchased and dispensed over 140,000 dog waste bags in the last year (removing thousands of pounds of harmful dog waste, improves the quality of the Accotink, Chesapeake Bay watersheds but also of the overall health of the environment).

\*Margaret Kinder Education and Pollinator Garden – Lake Accotink Park - April 2021 marks five years since the initial conception of this educational pollinator garden. Our Pollinator garden consists of over 900 plants and 14 + varieties. We provide educational brochures, pack of seeds (native plants) and other items to help the attendees get their own garden started. We also hold monthly volunteer care sessions for the Garden.

\*Special Programs – Projects (We Plan, Organize, Provide Supplies, Outreach, Coordinate, Execute, with our Partners): - Young FLAPer program, The 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Lake Accotink Park, Pictures with Santa, High School Events, Various Organizational Speaking, FCPA Working Groups and Support Activities.

\*Awards 2022 Youth Elly Doyle Park Service Award (Yasmine Marrero, Director Young FLAPers), 2022 Harold L. Strickland Partnership and Collaboration Award, Best of Braddock Award

We could not have accomplished the magnitude of these impacts without our partnership with FCPA, Lake Accotink Park and our Community of dedicated Volunteers, Sponsors and Donors. We look forward to your support in 2023.






Would you vacation on an island with complete strangers?

**Book Review: Remarkably Bright Creatures**

Shelby Van Pelt frames the story as a mystery but it's more about relationships.

Friendships cannot be categorized and may be fraught with surprises such as when they develop between species. One such tender closeness grows between Tova, the elderly cleaning lady at the aquarium, who helps Marcellus, the giant octopus untangle his limbs from the 'spaghetti' computer cords during one of his nighttime explorations resolving his boredom and hunger. Marcellus speaks for himself in short chapters so we learn about his lifespan and habits first hand. He realizes that Tova still questions the death of her son in a drowning accident some 30 years previously. Marcellus gives her clues to ease her grief, but humans can be so slow to understand. Further, he knows that his own health is declining as old age fast approaches; this parallels Tova's decisions for her own future. Grieving is important and must be lived through, but life goes on with significant changes to be made. Cameron, a young drifter, comes to town hoping to find his unknown (and hopefully rich) father. Settling down enough to work temporarily at the aquarium, he too forms a friendship with Tova.

Sparks of humor splashed throughout keep the story from being maudlin. Details depicting the events of life with realistic particulars touch our hearts: children's love of dinosaurs, Tova's unwillingness to give all of her life secrets to her crafting friends i.e., the Knit-Wits, Cameron's unrealistic life expectations. Van Pelt's drive to present a touching story earns a score of 10 and will keep you wondering who is the brighter creature!




