Lake Accotink Update



Several members of the SCA Board and community attended a scheduled meeting of the Environmental Committee of the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors on April 25th. At this meeting, the Environmental Committee presented the results of the recent Public Survey where the community was invited to share their comments regarding the options of dredging or not dredging Lake Accotink. Following that presentation, Supervisor McKay raised questions concerning the future of the Lake. Deciding that additional research was needed to fully answer those questions, Supervisors Walkinshaw and Lusk proposed creating a task force to investigate various additional options for the Lake. There was no vote taken by the Board of Supervisors but a task force will be created. The task force, which will include representatives from the SCA, other interested community groups, and stakeholders, will be formed to investigate the issue further. On May 5th, the nonprofit advocacy group Save Lake Accotink published a press release announcing the proposed task force and listed some of their questions and points for consideration, which include:

- The need to include representatives from nearby civic and homeowner associations,
- The need to consult with other environmental and community advocacy groups,
- The need to consult with industry experts,
- The downstream impacts of county inaction, and the costs and impacts of letting Lake Accotink fill in.

The SCA will keep you informed about future discussions and decisions concerning Lake Accotink. (continued on pg. 3)

Lake Accotink is Given a Stay of Execution

Save Lake Accotink to Join Task Force to Look at Options for the Lake

Springfield VA— 05/05/2023 - At the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors Environmental Committee meeting on April 25, Braddock District Supervisor James Walkinshaw announced that he and Franconia District Supervisor Rodney Lusk would propose a task force to look into solutions to sedimentation in Lake Accotink, which Supervisor Walkinshaw called a Fairfax County "treasure." According to Supervisor Walkinshaw, the Lake Accotink Task Force will examine the existing dredging project plans and related studies to identify flaws and search for ways to improve the project and reduce the cost of dredging.

The nonprofit advocacy group Save Lake Accotink has asked about the cost of not dredging? Their website, SaveLakeAccotink.org asks, "Who pays the cost of doing nothing?" In response, Supervisor Walkinshaw, at a meeting with representatives from Save Lake Accotink on May 1st, invited the group to join the Lake Accotink Task Force. He noted that the Board of Supervisors would also seek the participation of representatives from nearby civic and homeowner associations, other environmental and community advocacy groups, and industry experts.

Along with reviewing the existing plans and studies, the Lake Accotink Task Force will examine the costs and impacts of letting Lake Accotink fill in, particularly the downstream impacts of county inaction. To date, the county has made no effort to identify and understand these impacts. The Board of Supervisors will charge the Lake Accotink Task Force with identifying alternatives to dredging that have not yet been considered. The proposal to form the task force will be put to the full Fairfax County Board of Supervisors at a May Board meeting.

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The Fairfax County Department of Public Works and Environmental Services have made a recommendation to the Board of Supervisors that Lake Accotink be allowed to fill in with sediment from upper Accotink Creek.

That is unacceptable for the environment, the community, and Fairfax County taxpayers.

Now we are three years old, the Springfield has come a long way in these three years and it is our feeling that residents, perhaps the especially new people, would enjoy reminiscing about the "early days" with us.

Civic Association Organized February 1953 found 100 residents turning out for the first meeting of the Springfield Civic Association held at the home of William Bagot, 6020 Back Lick Road, Mr. Bill Horton, who now resides in Pennsylvania, was acclaimed temporary chairman. Four fact-finding committees were also appointed—to investigate speed limits on Back Lick Road; house-to-house mail delivery; installation of street lights; and police and fire protection. Committee included Mr. Bob Impey, Mr. Barry Carlton, Mr. Jobn Tate and Mr. Herman Williams, An organia charter was also appointed with Mr. Knox Singleton in charge.

New Post Office In Springfield Mr. Roy T. Bowman, Postmaster, and his two employees moved on February 2, 1953, to the new Springfield Post Office in the Lynch Shopping Center. Prior to this, residents

It's the Season for Gardens at Grace Presbyterian Church

Spring means it's time to get back in touch with nature—with gardens to be freshened up, new seeds to be planted, and wildflowers to be enjoyed! At Grace Presbyterian Church, on Bath Street in the heart of Crestwood, this is no exception. Warmer weather means there are even more ways we are able to use church grounds to enhance the natural beauty of the neighborhood.



Native Plants Support Pollinators. Since before the pandemic, volunteers have worked with local cooperative extension groups to identify and plant native shrubs and flowers on church property along Bath Street. Each of the plantings is identified with signs about its role in our ecosystem with *special emphasis on plants favored by pollinators*. Near the larger parking lot on the north side of the church, you will find a patch of milkweed that for several years has been home to many monarch caterpillars and chrysalises! You are welcome to explore this landscaping and the others that are located throughout the grounds.



Vegetable Garden. Adjacent to this pollinator garden is the newly-

installed vegetable garden. This latest addition to the church landscaping is a collaborative project of garden enthusiasts/church members and our youth group. As the vegetables grow this summer they will be harvested to support food-insecure families in our community through ECHO and other organizations. *Many hands make light work*, and volunteers are always welcome to help with this project! Crop Table. As the spring turns to summer, our Grace garden and gardens throughout Crestwood will begin to produce fresh, delicious fruits and vegetables. Every week in the summer, we offer this fresh produce, along with homemade baked goods, jams, jellies, and crafts, as a fundraiser for local hunger initiatives, including ECHO. Since 2010, the Grace Crop Table has raised over \$37,000 for local and worldwide hunger efforts. Over \$5,000 was raised last year alone when the Crop Table commemorated Clara Gipson, one of the founders of this effort. 

Book Review: Beyond the Bright Sea

In the acclaimed *Beyond the Bright Sea*, Lauren Wolk has woven fiction with historical fact to create the charming narrative of a child's search for identity and family as told from the child's point of view. The story takes place about a hundred years ago on a few of the smallest of the Elizabeth Islands off the coast of Massachusetts. Crow, as the girl is known, was so named for her croaking cry when as a small baby she was discovered in a leaky skiff by Osh. Osh, a fisherman leading a most solitary existence on the tiniest of the islands, like Crow has origins shrouded in mystery.

Crow leads a happy if simple childhood with Osh in their makeshift cottage home. Days are spent gathering vegetables from their little garden and harvesting all manner of seafood from the bountiful ocean. In addition, Crow has acquired some book learning from Miss Maggie, a kind if brusque friend from another nearby island, close enough to walk to at low tide. Crow tried going to the local school at one time but gave it up because she felt unwelcome, rejected because of her differences and dark suspicions about her origin.

As Crow attains her eleventh year, her contentment with leaving her past unknown wears thin and she becomes determined to know where she came from and who she really is. Given the tides and currents that must have borne her to her island home, she suspects her parents were members of a leper colony once housed on another nearby island. Crow resolves to visit the island, and finally persuades Osh and Miss Maggie to accompany her. The visit to the abandoned leper colony provides answers but even more questions. Crow's growing quest, both on the islands and in the town, leads to encounters with many who help her towards her goal, but also with a few who are less than helpful, or worse. (continued on pg. 9)



While mystery and action intrigue the reader, Wolk always keeps a light touch, never revealing more than need be told to advance the plot. Since the story is told from Crow's perspective, the language is simple and the analysis never runs deep. The reader is left to speculate and sometimes fill in what is not explicitly stated, a device that serves to engage us only more fully in this delightful tale, one that leaves us asking for more from this bestselling writer.

Book Review: Someone Else's Shoes

Have you ever picked up someone else's purse or gym bag, even taking it home? When Sam (middle aged, tired, working mother) and



Nisha (wealthy, middle aged snob) accidentally exchange gym bags the lives of at least six people will be changed forever. Prolific, popular British writer Jojo Moyes has a special talent to provide readers with hoots of laughter and sobs of sadness at the very same time as she depicts common occurrences in new ways.

The complications involved in reuniting owner with bag take 400 pages, but Moyes has managed to highlight many hot topic issues in ways that will entertain and make you think. Including the role fancy, well maintained clothes have on a person's demeanor. Snap judgments about a person because of his/her clothes could be a mistake. The effect of a parent's clinical depression on a family. The importance of friendship in people's lives. The role of subservient women in dysfunctional marriages. The poverty of single-parent households trying to provide for families. Parenting a gender-questioning teenager. Summarizing this plot would take the full length of the novel, but many plot twists -- some a surprise, some expected, some sad and some gleeful -- delight the reader before the bags are reunited with their owners and all is right with the world. These twists enable the characters to mature and grow. Only once did the events seem to be of a slapstick nature. But even so, I'm looking forward

to this being made into a movie and in the meantime it is a great summer read.

How can I prevent and treat Lyme disease?



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

No matter what type of vehicle you drive, one of the safest choices drivers and passengers can make is to buckle up.

As you head out around the Memorial Day holiday, you'll likely see more law enforcement on the roads as part of *Click It or Ticket*. Buckle Up the Right Way

In June 2021, a few SCA members took Supervisor Rodney Lusk on a tour of Springfield. One of the concerns the SCA pointed out to Supervisor Lusk was the lack of access to the signalized pedestrian crossing button at the corner of Old Keene Mill Road and Hanover Avenue. That signal was on a traffic pole that was raised and too far away from the sidewalk for handicapped users to use safely.

The Springfield Civic Association has kept in touch with Supervisor Lusk's office since 2021 asking about the status of improvements to the accessible pedestrian signal button. On May 8, 2023, the work began on bringing the crosswalk signal button up to ADA

requirements!

Thanks to the SCA, especially Diane Boughton, who has never let this issue fade from importance since 2021, our handicapped neighbors will now have a safe and accessible way to cross a busy intersection.
