"I hiked 3 miles into the Grand Canyon and back up. Hot and very tiring. 2100 feet elevation change. The Colorado River is in the background."



Fairfax County Public Library (FCPL) system provides a portal to Kanopy, a free subscription on-demand streaming video service. It offers "enriching films that bridge cultural boundaries, spark discussion and expand worldviews." With access to 30,000+films, documentaries, classics and indie titles, cardholders are sure to find something they love. FCPL cardholders who create Kanopy accounts are issued five 'play credits' at the beginning of each month and have three days to watch a video once a credit is used to borrow it.

In addition to the main streaming collection, the service includes unlimited access to <u>Kanopy Kids</u>, a children's area with a parental control PIN to limit access. Children can view "Sesame Street" or PBS Kids episodes.

Friends,

I am pleased to update you on the exciting progress we are making here in Springfield. First, I encourage you to sign up for my newsletter to stay informed about what's happening in the Franconia District and the Board of Supervisors. You can subscribe online at Fairfaxcounty.gov/Franconia or by calling my office at (703) 971-6262.

I want to thank everyone who participated in the Springfield BridgeWalk on August 17th. Hundreds of community members walked across Veterans Bridge in Springfield and witnessed the signing of the Community Covenant between Fairfax County, Fort Belvoir, and the veteran community. More than 20 community organizations and county agencies provided information and giveaways. I am grateful to American Legion Post 176 for taking the lead and working with my office and Fort Belvoir to revive this decades-old tradition that had paused during the COVID-19 pandemic. Thank you to the Springfield Civic Association for your participation and warm welcome to Garrison Commander Col. David J. Stewart and Franconia District Police Station Commander Maj. Marisa Kuhar. I look forward to continuing the tradition for many years to come.

As many of you know, the Springfield Community Business Center Commuter Parking Garage is scheduled to open in September. The facility includes 1,100 parking spaces, bike storage, commuter slug lines, and multiple bus bays. Fairfax Connector is making significant changes to bus routes to maximize the garage's transit potential. In addition to transit services, the garage will host two community spaces. Starting sometime next year, the street-level open plaza will be available for food trucks, farmers markets, and small community gatherings on evenings and weekends. Also starting next year, a rooftop park will be open all week for various activities, including arts and entertainment performances, exercise classes, and corporate events. I was pleased to hear that many of you attended the virtual public meeting on July 15 regarding the Springfield Boulevard Comprehensive Plan Amendment proposal, which includes properties near Backlick Road and Old Keene Mill Road. The proposal is for a mixed-use development with up to 732 multi-family residential units and 10,000 square feet of retail. There will be more opportunities to provide feedback on the proposed amendment to the Comprehensive Plan, including votes at the Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors this fall. I am committed to working with you to advance revitalization in this area, with your thoughts and suggestions taken into consideration.

Several other exciting developments are underway in and around Springfield. You may have noticed the cranes near the Springfield Town Center, where construction has begun on about 400 new multi-family residential units. It is important to note that these units will be the first new multi-family residential units in Springfield in over 20 years. We anticipate construction on a 140-room hotel to begin later this year. Additionally, the Board of Supervisors has approved 40 new townhouses near Wesley Road and Villa Park Road. (continued on pg. 4)

We're also welcoming a new self-storage site to Springfield, which will replace the empty lot behind the TownePlace Suites at the corner of Brandon Avenue and Commerce Street. The Board approved the rezoning application last October and construction permit applications are now underway. The facility will feature a unique, attractive office-like design to blend with Springfield's revitalized character. The ground floor will include commercial retail space, and pedestrian improvements and parking will be added.

INOVA has broken ground on one of the largest development projects in the history of our District: a new 110-bed hospital at the corner of Franconia-Springfield Parkway and Beulah Street, expected to be completed in 2028. This project will significantly benefit the Franconia District, especially Springfield and Kingstowne, by reducing response times for medical emergencies, creating over 1,200 jobs, and boosting local businesses.

I know many of you are also interested in the latest updates on Lake Accotink. Fairfax County staff are conducting multiple studies to explore the smaller-lake option, including sedimentation and dam assessments, and a general feasibility study. Public outreach will be part of this process, and my office will share updates as we receive more information.

When I attended the Second Story Community Focus Group meetings at the Springfield Resource Center in May, I heard the need for more out-of-school activities for youth in this area.

In August, I participated in a trail walk at Mason Neck State Park with the Second Story Springfield Safe Youth Project. Activities included supervised recreation, a nature walk, and ranger-led environmental education. This is just one example of the activities that are being funded by public-private partnerships, like Friends of Mason Neck State Park, to ensure youth have productive and meaningful experiences after school, on the weekends, and during breaks.

In closing, I am proud to share that Fairfax County continues to be the safest jurisdiction of its size in the country. Violent crime rates remain low, and in many cases continue to drop. The Franconia District Police Station coverage area, which includes Springfield, saw a 6% increase in arrests, a 6% reduction in criminal calls for service, and an 8% reduction in incidents overall in June year-to-date. Traffic citations (excluding speed cameras) are up 10%. This progress is thanks to our dedicated officers and our vigilant community. Early Voting Begins September 20

The November General Election is fast approaching. It's time to make your plan to vote!



Early voting for this year's election begins in a little over two weeks on Friday, September 20. View a full list of early voting locations on the County's website.

If you haven't registered to vote yet, there's still time.
You can register or update your existing registration
on Virginia's Voter Portal. The deadline to register to vote is
October 15. If you register between October 16 through Election
Day, you can vote using a provisional ballot.

If you plan on voting by mail, you must request a mail-in ballot by October 25. The ballots will be mailed out on September 20. After receiving your ballot, it must be postmarked and sent by Election Day, Tuesday, November 5.

School Bus Safety Cameras


The safety and wellbeing of our residents are of the upmost importance, and this is especially true for our children. Unfortunately, it's not uncommon for a driver to speed past a school bus while it has its stop-arm out and its red lights are flashing. Recognizing

that this poses significant risk to our children, Fairfax County will soon be launching a school bus arm camera program.



Fifty school bus camera systems will be installed

throughout the County to help identify and issue citations to drivers who refuse to stop while school buses are loading and unloading children. The County is working to make sure they use technology in every way possible to better protect our students. There is no excuse for a driver in a vehicle to ever pass a stopped bus that is loading or unloading students and has their stop-arm extended and red-lights flashing. Being a distracted driver is never an excuse to put our kids at risk.



The goal is to get these cameras installed this calendar year. Once up and running, the installed cameras will capture vehicles speeding past buses that are loading and unloading children. That footage will then be sent to a Fairfax County police officer for review. If the officer verifies that there was a violation, a ticket with a \$250 fine will be sent to the vehicle's registered owner. The goal of this program is to keep our children safe by changing driver behavior. You can learn more by visiting the County's Speed Camera Program Update.

ECHO's Food Pantry

A summer with few food drives and low food donations has left ECHO's Food Pantry with urgent needs. We hope that our generous community will help us soon. Requests for food assistance are higher than pre-Covid levels. ECHO sees clients by appointment so as not to overwhelm our capacity, and every food assistance appointment is filled nearly every day. Other organizations are seeing the same level of need.







Springfield Icon David Fischer Remembered

David Charles Fischer

July 25, 1928 — June 15, 2024



Brilliant business mind and Springfield founding father, David Fischer, passed on to his next chapter June 15, 2024, following a valiant battle with Alzheimer's.

Mr. Fischer was born in Buffalo, New York on July 25, 1928, to Ester and Charles Fischer. He was the fourth of five children. A devoted husband of more than 44 years to his wife Wanda, David had six children by his first wife, Margaret. David also raised Wanda's daughter and helped raise a host of grandchildren. His love and acceptance was a model of step parenthood for his entire family.

Following High School, Mr. Fischer studied drafting and worked as a draftsman for General Electric in Buffalo. After his marriage to Margaret, he relocated to Northern Virginia, where he started as a shoe

salesman in Shirlington, Va. While there, he met Wally Stapleton, who would later become his store manager at Fischer Hardware. In the mid 1950s, he left the shoe business and began working with his father-in-law at Springfield Paint and Hardware. Shortly thereafter, Mr. Fischer bought out his father-in-law and changed the store name to the iconic Fischer Hardware, a beloved Springfield business for well over 50 years.

Under his direction, the store expanded five times and was ultimately housed in what was once the Safeway grocery store across from Mike's American Grill. Mr. Fischer had a staff of close to 75, and many employees worked for him for decades. The store sold in 2010.

An avid sportsman, Mr. Fischer loved to fish and hunt in his earlier years. He graduated to snowmobiling and boating, eventually settling on sailing as his passion. His final sailboat was a 52 foot Irwin that he lovingly designed and piloted from Tampa, Florida to Solomons, Maryland in the summer of 1980.

To those lucky enough to have known him, he will be remembered as a gentle, caring, charismatic man who detested conflict and expected civility from and afforded civility to everyone he met.

Lake Accotink Update

On July 23, the Board of Supervisors Environmental Committee was updated on the Lake Accotink Project by representatives from the Department of Public Works and Environmental Services (DPWES). The presentation summarized the information concerning preservation of a smaller lake that would retain much of the aesthetic and recreational value that park visitors currently enjoy. Three efforts are underway, and a dedicated Lake Accotink Project Manager has been hired to oversee this project.

- Sedimentation Study: The U.S. Geological Survey (USGS) and consultant support are being used to establish an additional
 gage location, perform more physical surveying, and complete additional studies to refine the understanding of the material
 moving through and being captured by Lake Accotink. Monitoring work will extend through 2027.
- **Dam Assessment:** The Fairfax County Park Authority is leading the effort, with support from DPWES. Work is anticipated to begin this fall and be finalized in early 2025.
- Preservation Study: The project team is working on final refinement of the scope of work, which will include assessing, evaluating, and identifying workable options to preserve Lake Accotink as a smaller lake.

The scope of work will be shared for public input prior to authorization. Work is anticipated to begin in Fall 2024. Updates will be provided periodically, and initial study results based on the first year of USGS monitoring data should be published in late 2025. Additional updates to the study will be necessary using updated USGS monitoring of sedimentation rates through 2027.






